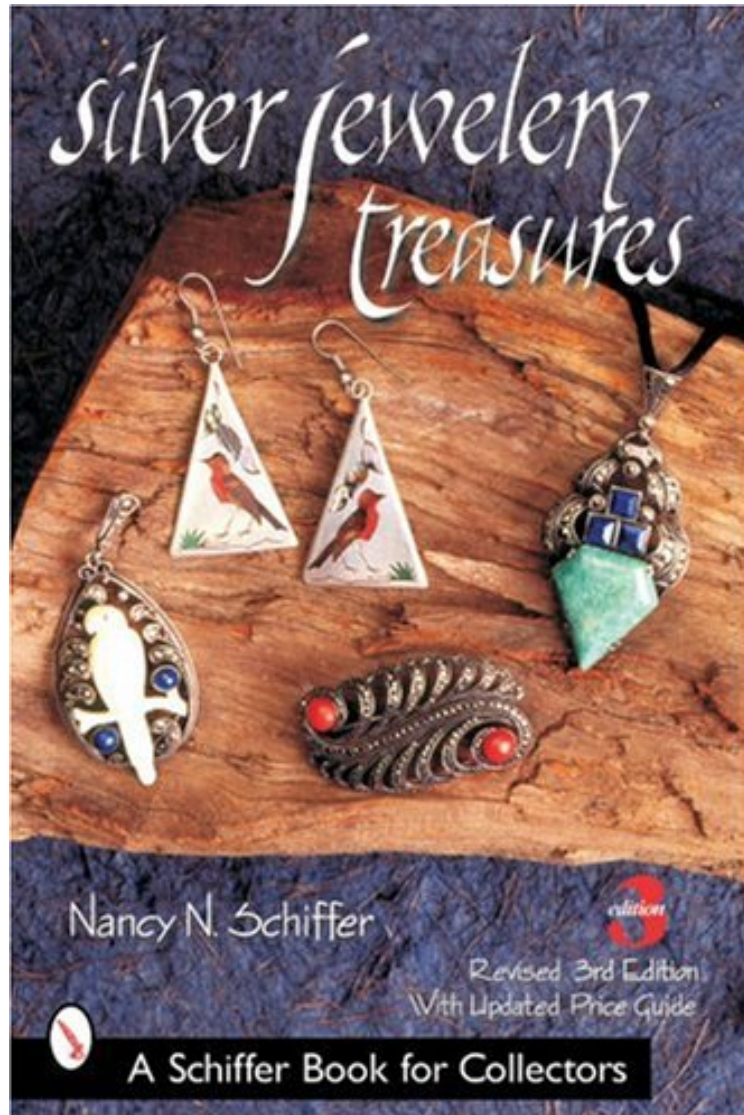

The worst reference book that I have ever purchased....and I have MANY in my personal library. When you write a reference book, it should be because you have some special knowledge to share with the world. This book is horribly written. Information is either in error, missing or incomplete. For example: Nancy, the word is ALPACA, a silver metal that the Mexicans use to make less expensive pieces that look like sterling silver, but

has no silver content at all. And that bracelet, "HECHO EN MEXICO" is an Antonio Pineda! I could go on about this, but if you are a dealer needing information, you will know more about what you are looking at than the author. If you are a collector, you will learn the wrong information and end up confused. Is this a coffee table picture book? No. The photography is terrible. This book appears to be just a jumbled bunch of photographs of the author's friends' collections, thrown in no particular order into some sort of lousy book.
